
EXPRESS YOUR INNER MAP



EARLIEST SURVEYING AND MAPPING OF WISCONSIN

BETWEEN 1832 AND 1866 the US Government Land Office surveyed and mapped the area that would become Wisconsin, dividing the landscape into the now familiar grid of townships and sections. At section corners, surveyors documented information about "witness trees," including their species, size, and location. They also collected information about vegetation, soils, and wetlands, and produced maps of each township.

IN THE 1990s the Forest Landscape Ecology Lab at UW-Madison digitized the survey data to create the Wisconsin Historic Landscape database. The database has been used for many purposes by agencies, conservation groups, educators, and the general public. The database is linked to the Public Land Survey System, making it possible to derive a variety of different maps.
