A Brief History of the Wisconsin Presidents Council

The Wisconsin Presidents Council (WPC) was established in 1996 to improve communications between the many professional associations in Wisconsin having a stake in land information and land information modernization.

From the beginning, the specific focus of the WPC has been on sharing information regarding current and future legislation affecting land information in Wisconsin. The WPC is informally organized, and has no formal bylaws or charter. As such, the WPC has no formal authority, funding, or executive sponsorship.

The WPC was originally formed *ad hoc* by Roxanne Moore (Burnett County) after a group of officers from several organizations met during the 1996 Wisconsin Land Information Association Annual Conference, and discussed the value of having regular communications between the various stakeholder associations.

Except for one gap in 2004-2006, the WPC has met regularly since 1996, typically in October of each year. Topics covered during the meetings have varied considerably over the years, but true to the mission of the group, most discussions revolve around legislative issues. Meetings are typically a half day in length.

Jim Lacy (SCO) volunteered to be the "archivist" for the group in 2008, and keeps copies of all the meeting minutes.

Membership

In 1996, there were (according to 1998 minutes) 24 organizations on the contact list that received invitations to attend the annual meetings.
